

**MINUTES OF THE  
FERNLEY CITY COUNCIL MEETING**

**April 5, 2017**

Due to legal brief Mayor Edgington called the meeting to order at 5:04 pm at Fernley City Hall, 595 Silver Lace Blvd, Fernley, NV.

**1. INTRODUCTORY ITEMS**

**1.1. Roll Call**

**Present:** Mayor Roy Edgington, Councilman Dan McCassie, Councilwoman Sue Seidl, Councilwoman Shari Whalen, Councilman Stan Lau, Councilwoman Fran McKay. City Manager City Manager Daphne Hooper, City Attorney Brandi Jensen, Public Works Director Dave Whalen, City Treasurer Denise Lewis, City Clerk Kim Swanson, Deputy Public Works Director Ozzie Henke, Senior Planner Tim Thompson, Associate Engineer Jessica Dover, Building Official Rick Kabele, Deputy City Attorney Brent Kolvet, GIS/Water Rights Manager Jennifer Derley.

**1.2. Public Comment**

Steve Southard, Fernley resident, expressed concern regarding the vagrants and the refugees at the Pilot Truck Stop. He stated his family' home was burglarized. He has asked the Sheriff's office to patrol by but nothing has been done.

William Robertson, Fernley resident, spoke about crimes, public health and safety at the Pilot Truck Stop. He stated there is an estimated of 20 acres of underground structures, garbage, needles, human waste, and drug waste buried. He stated this is being allowed to take place and was told by the Sheriff's office that if he goes out there he is breaking the law by being on private property.

Peggy Gray, Fernley resident, reported the street light at 95A and Sage Street could not have been installed without the support of City Council and City Staff. She specifically thanked the Mayor and Public Works Director Whalen.

Regina Brush, Fernley resident, thanked the City Council, and the parks crew, for keeping and maintaining the tennis courts.

Cindy Southern, Fernley resident, expressed concern regarding the increase in water rates, homeless people, and the abandoned cars and garbage by the railroad tracks.

John Reichlein, Fernley resident, thanked the City Council and Public Works regarding the street lights. He also expressed concern over the rising water rates.

**3.1.Reports By City Staff, City Council And The Mayor, Including But Not Limited To Monthly Statistical Reports By City Departments.**

City Manager Hooper reported there will be a Budget Meeting on Monday, April 10<sup>th</sup> at 5pm and another one on Thursday, April 13<sup>th</sup> if needed.

Rick Kabele, Building Official reported the stats for the month of April for the Building Department.

Mayor Edgington reported Veterans Cemetery 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary is taking place an everyone is invited. He also reported on the meeting with the Sheriff's Office, BLM, and City staff regarding the property behind Pilot Travel Center. The area of concern involving vagrants is a piece of BLM property. They are working with BLM, and the property owner to have the property cleaned up.

Sheriff McNeil also reported on the meeting with BLM to communicate the successes that the County and City is having and the long cumbersome process involving the vagrants. The sheriff cannot take action, because of the issues with the private property. Sheriff McNeil reported the City can take action on the unregistered vehicles.

City Manager Hooper reported a good cooperative meeting. They are working together on future strategies. Some deadlines on the radar, and she will continue to monitor these as things move forward.

Mayor Edgington stated the City does not have legal rights to go on private property. He invited everyone to go to Carson City and lobby their legislatures to get a bill for absentee landlords. He said the City and County are working diligently to take care of the problem within confinements of the law.

### **3.2. 2017 State Of Nevada Legislative Update**

City Manager Hooper reported City staff attended the hearing regarding AB311 before the Legislature. She explained there was some opposition from Lyon County. She stated she is still waiting to hear something and more discussion will follow. City Manager Hooper stated Mayor Edgington testified for the Diesel Tax Bill. This bill would provide the County Commissioner with the option to impose a tax up to .05 for the collection of diesel fuel. The deadline for bills to be out of the first house is April 17<sup>th</sup>.

Mayor Edgington presented Maria Duran and Toni Sterlinger with a proclamation, proclaiming April 4, 2017, as National Service Recognition Day.

## **6. AGENDA ITEMS CARRIED OVER FROM THE MARCH 15th CITY COUNCIL MEETING**

### **6.1. Discussion And Possible Action Regarding Future And Current Bike And Pedestrian Projects In The City Of Fernley As Well As Funding Options And Holistic Bike And Pedestrian Planning.**

This item was removed from the agenda.

### **6.2. Discussion And Possible Action To Approve Proposed Signage And Enforcement Of Commercial Truck Parking In Residential Neighborhoods.**

This item was combined with Item 8.4

This item was heard after Item 7.2.

Building Official Rick Kabele stated the staff report outlines what was needed to be able to enforce no commercial truck parking in residential areas. He explained there is a regulation under Fernley Municipal Code that is unenforceable. The code states under the jurisdiction the appropriate traffic devices must be posted. He added signage will need to be ordered and posted in order to enforce the law.

Councilman McCassie inquired if a commercial vehicle can be parked on an acre or better. Building Official Kabele stated there is an exception for recreational vehicles.

Mr. Kabele answered questions from the City Council.

Councilman McCassie clarified the intent for putting signage is to enforce the no parking in areas throughout the City for commercial vehicles. Mr. Kabele stated this would allow them to write a citation for the violation of the parking. Mayor Edgington asked who write the citation. Mr. Kabele stated sworn officers including his staff and Lyon County Sheriff's Officers would write the citations.

Councilwoman Whalen was in support of placing signs at the main entrance of the City. Building Official Kabele stated where they are placed will be at the discretion of the City Council. Planning Director Tim Thompson explained the item tonight affects commercial vehicles and RV's parked on the street. The code is unclear as to commercial vehicles parked on private property.

This item was heard after the 5.2

City Manager Hooper reported on false alarms and the impact they have on law enforcement. Lyon County enforced a bill to work with an outside management agency for the monitoring of the systems. She stated if adopted a Resolution with a fee schedule will have to come back before Council.

Sheriff McNeil reported Lyon County has adopted the same bill. He introduced Donna Cupp, Communications Manager for Lyon County Sheriff's Dispatch Center. Ms. Cupp stated the center covers 7 law enforcement agencies and 4 fire districts. Ms. Cupp reported the impact to the center with false alarm calls.

Sheriff McNeil acknowledged there is a false alarm problem in the City of Fernley. He reported in 2016 there were 540 alarm calls 535 were false. Lyon County had one valid alarm call out of 692 calls. Sheriff McNeil stated the cost is approximately \$120 tax dollars for one call. He explained the owner has a choice to install an alarm system in their home. Sheriff McNeil expressed the need for an ordinance that enforces a fee to the owners of alarm systems to get the false alarms under control.

Sheriff McNeil stated if someone wants law enforcement to respond to their alarm call, they need to register their alarm system every year. Lyon County did not agree on this option. His recommendation was for an ordinance that would adopt a requirement for everyone to register their alarm system and pay a fee to recuperate the cost for administration.

Sheriff McNeil and Communications Manager Cupp answered questions from the City Council. Councilman McCassie disclosed that his business has an alarm.

Councilwoman Whalen was concerned about the lack of public involvement and a customer being charged the 1<sup>st</sup> time law enforcement is called for a false alarm.

Councilwoman McKay asked Ms. Cupp if the numbers of false alarms could be categorized by commercial and residential alarms. She stated no because they are categorized the same.

Councilwoman Whalen is in support of the ordinance but was concerned that a first offender would be charged.

Mayor Edgington called for public input.

Becky Howlett, Fernley resident, agreed with charging for false alarms.

City Attorney Jensen presented the Bill. She stated this ordinance would be treated very similar to alcohol.

Councilman Lau asked what would happen if the person who is on the drug for medical reasons is pulled over while driving and a sheriff finds the open container in the vehicle. City Attorney Jensen explained it depended on the impairment and did it reflect on the person's driving.



Councilwoman Whalen stated she had trouble with the open container language. She inquired about transporting marijuana.

Sheriff NcNeil stated it should be treated the same as alcohol. He stated it could be transported in the bed of the truck. He stated every container would have to be out of the passenger compartment of the vehicle.

Mayor Edgington called for Public Input. There was none.

Public Works Director Whalen explained there were issues in 2013 when the City took the cemetery over. He proposed to amend the resolution to require a deposit on the burial marker and include a new ordinance to omit the payment plan. He stated it consumes a lot of time to purchase plots, take payments and track payments.

Councilwoman Seidl suggested removing the name from the burial plot agreement. Mr. Whalen stated the name on the burial agreement is to keep track who was originally intended to be buried in the plot.

Councilwoman Seidl suggested removing #9 on the Burial Agreement. She also asked to change the wording of the ordinance to “do ordain”.

Councilman McCassie inquired about digging the plot. Councilman McCassie disclosed that he owns a tractor service, but he is not a licensed contractor.

## **8. STAFF REPORTS**

### **8.1. Discussion And Possible Action To Approve The City Manager's Salary**

City Manager Hooper explained her salary. She explained the comparisons from Transparent Nevada. Her salary comes from 90% general fund, 10% water. She currently receives \$109,200 which does not include the \$5,000 bonus. She suggested \$120,000 with no bonus and the City would actually save money if she would meet the qualifications of the bonus.

Councilwoman Seidl suggested removing the bonus and paying 120,000.

**Motion:** MOVE TO APPROVE INCREASING THE CITY MANAGER SALARY TO 120,000 BEGINNING JULY 1, 2017, **Action:** Approve, **Moved by** Councilwoman Sue Seidl, **Seconded by** Councilwoman Shari Whalen.

Councilwoman Whalen stated turnover can have an impact on the City she felt like it was money well spent.

**Motion passed unanimously.**

### **8.2. Discussion And Possible Action To Accept The Business Impact Statement With Regards To Commercial Rate Increase To Water And Sewer Utilities.**

This item was heard after 6.2.

Deputy Public Works Director Henke presented the results of the Commercial Rate Increase to Water and Sewer Utilities. School District per pupil rate did drop on the sewer usage. The school district could save when school is not in session. Surveys were mailed to commercial users, and two workshops were held. A resolution will be brought back at the next City Council meeting.

Councilwoman Whalen disclosed that she is employed by the Lyon County School District. She stated some of the comments were distressing to her. She stated she would come up with any other alternative if possible.

**Motion:** MOVE TO ACCEPT THE BUSINESS IMPACT STATEMENT REGARDING THE WATER AND SEWER UTILITY RATE INCREASE. **Action:** Approve, **Moved by** Councilwoman Sue Seidl, **Seconded by** Councilwoman Shari Whalen. **Motion passed unanimously.**

### **8.3. Update, Discussion, And Possible Direction To The Public Works Department Regarding E-One Units In The City Of Fernley.**

Public Works Director Whalen stated he has supplied the City Council with the requested information. There are approximately 220 E-One Units in the City of Fernley maintained by the City.

Councilwoman Whalen wanted to change design standards for future subdivisions to allow E-Ones. She stated there are times where E-Ones are important like a custom home. Councilwoman McKay disclosed that she has an E-one unit in her yard. Councilwoman McKay will abstain from this item.

**Motion:** MOVE TO DIRECT STAFF TO MODIFY THE PUBLIC WORKS DESIGN STANDARD TO MAKE ANY FUTURE SUBDIVISIONS WOULD NOT BE APPROVED TO BE SERVED SOLEY BY AN E-ONE UNIT, IT WILL ONLY BE APPROVED WITH A RECOMMENDATION BY BOTH THE CITY ENGINEER AND THE PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR. **Moved by** Councilwoman Shari Whalen, **Seconded by** Councilwoman Sue Seidl. **Action:** Approve, **Vote:** Motion passed (summary: Yes = 4, No = 0, Abstain = 0). **Yes,** Councilman Stan Lau, Councilwoman Sue Seidl, Councilwoman Shari Whalen, Councilman Dan McCassie, Councilwoman Fran McKay.

Councilwoman Whalen felt the homeowner should pay monthly. She would like further discussion on the homeowner splitting the cost.

Councilwoman Whalen stated her perception would be if you wanted to connect to the City sewer, that you would automatically be part of the group that paid half of the line item.

Councilwoman Seidl stated any new grinder pumps be placed on private properties, and maintained and the responsibility of the owner and not the City. This will be included in the research and brought back to City Council.



\*Note that not all states calculate graduation rates the same.

For example, Nevada:

- Bases the rate on a 4 year cohort versus a 3 year cohort or senior class cohort.
- Excludes special education students who have received an adjusted diploma after meeting all of their IEP goals.
- Considers exiting students who fail to enroll in another school as dropouts.



### School Safety and Security

#### What has been done
